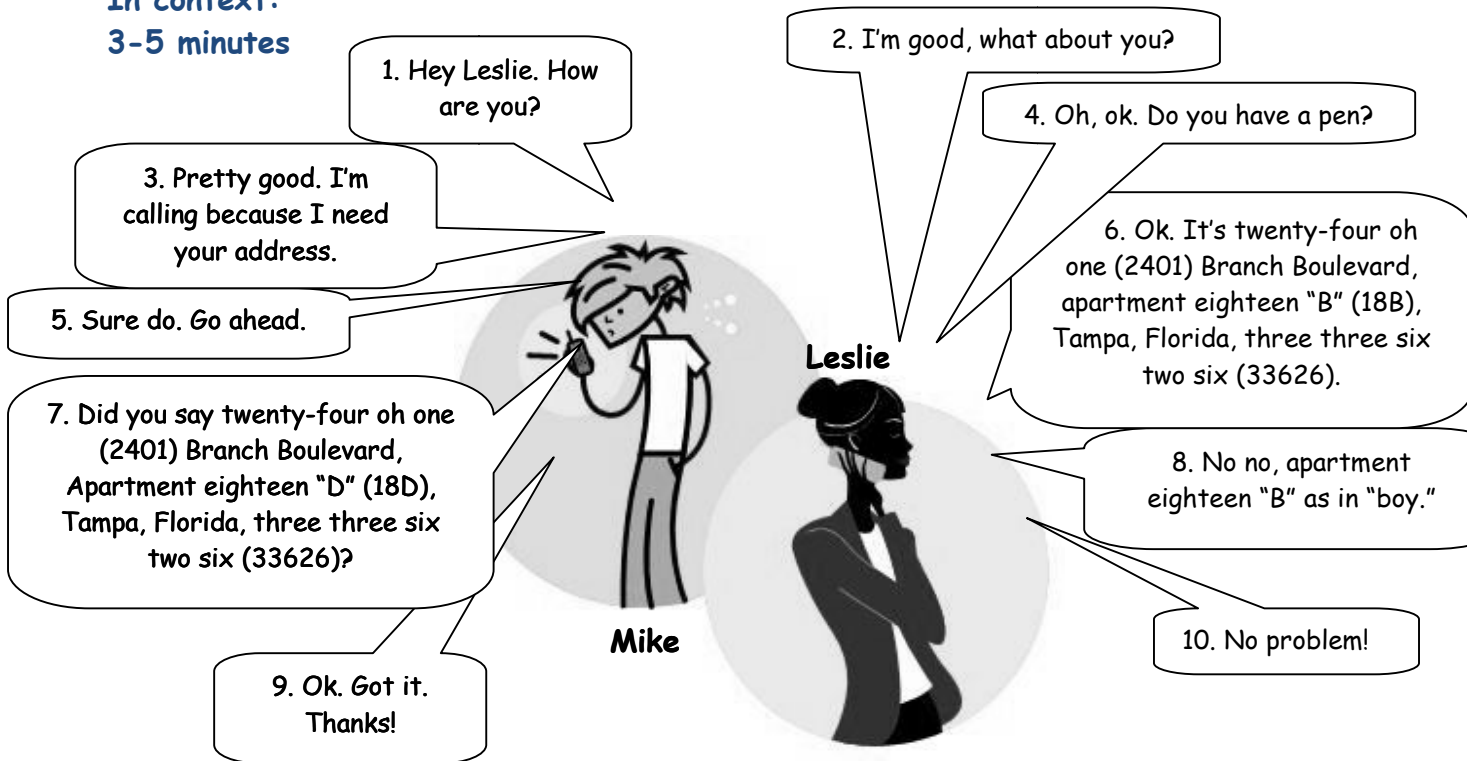


Where do you live? Giving your address

In American English, we "call" a person.

In British English, we "phone" a person.

Example:

I am calling because I need your address. (American English)

I am phoning because I need your address. (British English)

When talking, some letters sound the same. We often use common words that start with the same letters to be sure we do not make a mistake.

Example:

Paul: My name is Paul.

Amy: How do you spell that?

Paul: "P" as in "Peter," "A" as in "apple," "U" as in "umbrella," and "L" as in "lion"
